ST. ANNE'S HILL ADDED TO HISTORIC REGISTER, 1986

On June 5, 1986, St. Anne's Hill was added to the National Register of Historic Places. The National Park Service, which is part of the Department of the Interior, maintains the National Register. The purpose of the National Register is to support efforts to identify, evaluate, and protect our historic and archaeological resources. Properties in the National Register include districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that are significant in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, and culture.

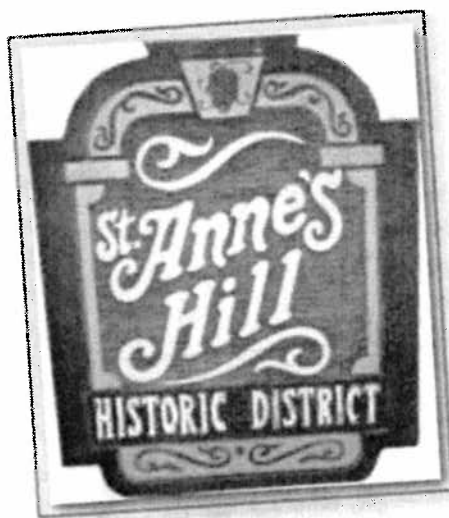
According to the National Register, St. Anne's Hill is an "excellent grouping of predominantly vernacular buildings displaying high style influences through decorative features." The Bossler Mansion is mentioned as one of many structures displaying the best of their style in Dayton. The Register also mentions that the "Hill" was included in original out-lots of Dayton, originally plotted in 1802 by Daniel C. Cooper. The Miami-Erie Canal was an important element in the development of the neighborhood and much of the neighborhood's earliest settlement was by German immigrants and tradesmen. The neighborhood saw much of its growth in the 1860's and 1870's and growth continued until early in the 20th century.

In the 1830's, newspaper advertisements promoted the sale of shrubbery and flowers from the greenhouse on St. Anne's Hill. In 1838 Eugene Dutoit built his farmhouse at 222 Dutoit Street, now owned by Chuck and Donna Wagner. In the late 1830's, Mr. Dutoit owned a 111-acre tract, which included an apple orchard. Because of fermenting apples from this orchard, the "Hill" was also called "Vinegar Hill. The reference to "Vinegar Hill" had been passed on over decades by word of mouth, according to Todd Carver, the member of St. Anne's Hill responsible for researching and applying to the National Register. Todd owned the "Cridland" House at 601 McLain. It is not believed that "St. Anne's Hill" is a name that prevailed for our neighborhood until it was re-established in 1973. References suggest the names "Smith's Hill," "Vinegar Hill," and "Bomberger" might have been equally correct names for our neighborhood. But out of all these possible names, most would agree "St. Anne's Hill" is the best choice.

In 2001, Stivers High School was also added to the National Register as a result of the efforts of Bobbie Puterbaugh-Allen. Inclusion in the National Register resulted in the restoration of the original building instead of demolishing the old school. Stivers is truly a jewel in our neighborhood, community and state.
